#### **United Methodist Women News**

On Sunday, January 26th, The United Methodist Women will introduce the First United Methodist Church to the Social Action topic of interrupting the School to Prison Pipeline. This Social Action initiative is for us to raise awareness for how we can improve the number of black lives that go straight from school to prison. In the Month of March, there will be a Sunday when Rev. Paul Beard who has been involved with Kairos Prison Ministry and Lighthouse 2911 that is a Non-Profit organization that works with juveniles on probation to provide them positive attitude and life skills to keep them from having re-occurring behaviors will come and share his experience as this can enhance our awareness of this topic.

Last year, from Feb 4th to 8th of 2019, United Methodist Women joined the chorus of educators, parents, students and community activists in calling for an end to zero tolerance policies, exclusionary disciplinary policies and practices, and investments in cops rather than school counselor. School districts are also investing in Black educators and Black history and ethnic studies curriculums. Harriet Olson, chief executive officer of United Methodist Women, states, "Every child has value and people of faith must continually assert the dignity and value of all of God's children."

Black Lives Matter at School is a national coalition of educators organizing for racial justice in education. United Methodist Women is committed to interrupting the school-to-prison pipeline regardless of how long it takes to do so.

We ask you to join us in learning how to support and emphasize this crucial social action topic.
